

*A New Area of Emphasis for the B.A. Degree in Romance Languages -*

**Ibero-American Comparative Studies (PTSP - Portuguese/Spanish)**

The Department of Romance Languages has established a new comparative area of emphasis combining the study of the language, literature and culture of Ibero-America. This area allows students to combine interests in Spanish, Portuguese, Spanish-American and Brazilian literature and culture, while developing their proficiency in both languages to a high level. The fundamental difference between PTSP and the preexisting Romance Languages major (with Spanish and Portuguese options) is that PTSP offers comparative courses at the undergraduate level where students will be asked to make explicit connections between, and understand the interconnectedness of, Spanish America and Portuguese America (and/or Spain and Portugal), especially with regards to their literary, linguistic, and cultural traditions. Three new courses (two under the new prefix of PTSP - see descriptions below) focus on the juxtaposition of the two languages, and their myriad of literary and cultural traditions. This area of emphasis will be an attractive option to the increasingly large number of UGA students who already possess some knowledge of both Spanish and Portuguese, and/or wish to deepen their dual language proficiency and understanding of the Ibero-American world. Moreover, it will allow some students to double major more easily, in such fields as Latin American Studies, International Affairs and Business. High proficiency in both languages has become increasingly essential for those students who wish to pursue a career in these fields within either a Latin American or Iberian context.

### **New Courses:**

#### PTSP 3010: Introduction to Ibero-American Language, Literature and Culture

This course will introduce a comparative framework and methodology early on in the student's program of study. It would also help students to begin thinking about particular areas (theme, genre, period, theory, other) that most interest them. While the specific focus of the course may vary, it is intended to give students the analytical tools and historical/literary contexts that will enable them to

establish connections between Spanish America and Brazil and/or Spain and Portugal. Taught in English.

ROML 4860: Topics in Afro-Lusophone/Hispanic Identity

Representations of Africa and African American culture in Luso-Hispanic Literature by writers of African descent. By covering a variety of genres, the course will provide discussion about a cultural identity that is constantly in dialogue with dominant discourses. This course will incorporate critical texts and introduce a comparative (Spanish/Portuguese) framework and methodology. Taught in English.

PTSP 4900: Ibero-American Senior Seminar

Near the end of the student's program of study a second comparative course is taken in a bilingual setting (Spanish and Portuguese for both readings and discussion). This seminar constitutes the culmination of the student's comparative program. The objective of this Senior Seminar is for students to review, integrate and clarify previous course content, and work towards a focused, substantial research project that is comparative in nature. Students will demonstrate a relatively in-depth knowledge of the internal and external dynamics that have helped shape broad socio-historical, literary, and linguistic trends in Ibero-America. Taught in Spanish and Portuguese.
